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- 1. Resources Available to Trace the Rise and Fall of the Vikings

Vikings: The North Atlantic Saga is a new web site created as a companion to the exhibition currently touring the country. Visitors to this site can view an online exhibit or purchase catalogs that explore the origins and impacts of the Vikings in history. From the rise of the Scandinavian kingdoms during the Viking Age (750 to 1050 A.D.) to the demise of the Greenland colonies around 1500 A.D., this web site examines the history of the western expansion of the Vikings and sheds new light on a well-known culture.

2. American Memory Collection Brings History to Life

The Library of Congress has placed over 70 collections online about some of the greatest times in American history in a special section called American Memory. This area showcases events such as the American Indians of the Pacific Northwest, the roots of blues and gospel music, and fiddle tunes of the old frontier. To help visitors access specific records, there are several different ways to retrieve information. These locators include a search area that locates items across all collections; a Collection Finder to select a collection or group of collections; a Learning Page to help students, teachers, and lifelong learners; and a section for Frequently Asked Questions.
